

STORMWATER POLLUTION WHAT DO YOU THINK?

- You may think littering is no big deal, but it is!
- You may think that whatever runs into the storm drains gets treated before it reaches local rivers and streams, but it doesn't!
- You may think that motor oil and other hazardous materials don't harm the water very much, but they do!

Pollution seeps into the ground, and it is carried by stormwater (rain and snow) directly into our drinking water, streams, lakes, and oceans. Contaminated stormwater is the number one cause of water pollution in New Jersey. Simple things like proper clean-up after oneself and careful use of chemicals in the home, office, and yard are helpful ways for businesses and residents to protect our water. The Borough of Bellmawr has Ordinances aimed at reducing pollution from litter, fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, animal waste, grass clippings, and other debris. Thank you for doing your share!

Remember:

- Keep grass, leaves, and trash out of storm drains.
- Don't feed wildlife.
- Clean up after your pet.
- Limit the use of fertilizers and pesticides.
- Properly handle hazardous products.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION

The final household hazardous waste collection events for 2025 will take place on:

- Saturday, September 27th at the Sanitary Landfill, 9600 N. River Road, Pennsauken.
- Saturday, October 18th at the Camden County Public Works Complex, 2311 Egg Harbor Road in Lindenwold.

These collection events are for Camden County residents only. No businesses or commercial vehicles will be accepted.

Residents can dispose of a variety of hazardous items, including:

- Automotive: Motor oil, car batteries, antifreeze.
- Paint-Related: Oil-based paint, paint thinners, spray paint.
- Household Cleaners: Bleach, disinfectants, drain openers.
- Pesticides and Lawncare: Weed killers, insecticides, fertilizers.
- Personal Care: Nail polish remover, iodine, hydrogen peroxide.
- Home and Hobby: Mercury thermometers, pool chemicals, propane tanks (under 25 lbs.)

What NOT to Bring:

Items such as medications, tires, smoke detectors, and commercial waste will not be accepted.

ROADWAY IMPROVEMENTS

Braisington Avenue

Bellmawr's commitment to roadway improvements continues. The Borough was selected to receive funding from the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) Fiscal Year 2024 for roadway improvements to Braisington Avenue.

The grant amount is \$417,255 for:

- Sidewalk installation on Braisington Avenue near the newly refurbished Joseph N. Petruzzli Playground.
- Replacement of three stormwater pipes along with the resurfacing of asphalt on Braisington Avenue from Spruce Avenue to Brown Avenue.

The project was awarded to Earle Asphalt, design, and inspection by Bach Associates. The Borough anticipates a June/July 2025 construction completion.

ROADWAY IMPROVEMENTS ASSOCIATED WITH WATER MAIN REPLACEMENTS

As part of Bellmawr's Water Quality Accountability Act (WQAA) program, the Borough contracted with Booth Mechanical to replace 2,750 feet of six-inch water main on several roadways. A summer 2025 paving schedule is anticipated.

The Bellmawr Highway Division will complete roadway reconstruction on the following streets:

- Thomas Avenue from W. Browning Road to Creek Road
- Meyner Drive from Thomas Avenue to Bell Road
- Princeton Avenue from Devenney Drive to Center Avenue
- Princeton Avenue from Carter Avenue to W. Browning Road

The roadway improvements include ADA ramp installation, select curb, apron, sidewalk replacement, and asphalt rehabilitation of roadway. Please be mindful of ALL construction workers, detours, and construction notices. Call (856) 931-1111 if you have any questions or concerns.
